Dear Sirs:

We, members of the InterReligious Taskforce on Central America, are extremely concerned for the safety of more than **10,000 workers in the sugar industry in the Departments of Valle del Cauca and Cauca** who went on strike in September 15 because of the refusal by the Sugar Cane Growers' Association, Asocaña, to negotiate on basic demands the workers presented in July for better pay, (they now make about \$200 per month), shorter hours, (they now frequently work 14 or more hours per day), a healthier work environment, better housing and educational facilities, and a formal work contract.

More than 100 workers were injured on September 15 when the President ordered the military into the mills to remove striking workers. The mill owners have called upon the national police and private security to stop and inspect mill workers; paramilitary groups have threatened several workers. The Ministry of Social Protection has stated that there is no "labor problem" but just a problem of "social order." The Minister has also impled that workers are taking action on behalf of illegal armed groups. These are code words that, in Colombia, often lead to repression and even death sentences.

We therefore strongly urge you to:

- immediately instruct state forces to halt their aggression against the legitimate protests of the cane cutters;
- begin immediate investigations of those responsible for physical attacks against the workers, make the results public and bring those responsible to justice;
- provide the sugar industry workers with work contracts and labor guarantees that include social security benefits, rights to free association and unionization;
- eliminate the system of association and co-operative contracts which are subjecting the workers to dangerous and unfair working conditions, violating labor rights contained in both domestic law and international agreements signed and ratified by the Colombian state and with the International Labor Organization.
