Dear Mr. Esquinaci and Mr. Nariño Torres,

We are outraged at the illegal firing, on November 11, of six workers on your Mongibello flower plantation just outside of Bogotá. The workers, **José Alexander Montenegro**, **José Abel Rincón**, **Samuel Rico**, **Juan Bautista López**, **Milton Páez and Sergio Fabián Bossa**, have been working there for over 15 years. They were dismissed for contacting one of Colombia's labor federations, the CUT, to talk about organizing a union in response to ongoing labor rights abuses on the plantation.

We remind you that firing workers for unionizing is illegal in Colombia, as well as in the United States. I urge you to immediately rehire the illegally dismissed workers and to respect the labor rights of all the workers employed by your company.
